

Tips to Avoid Rental Scams and Secure a Home

It is necessary to have some basic knowledge about scammers and their techniques to successfully secure a safe place to rent. In this document, we have provided you with a few tips and links to useful resources. We encourage you to read through the resources before booking your accommodation, so that you can protect yourself and your money.

THINGS TO CONSIDER BEFORE RENTING

When considering a rental property, it's essential to take certain precautions to avoid potential scams or unpleasant surprises. By verifying the legitimacy of the property and understanding the rental terms, you can ensure a smoother renting experience. Here are some key things to keep in mind before making any decisions.

- 1. Verify the property's existence**
Before making any payments, ensure the property is real. Use Google maps or other mapping tools to verify the location of the property and if it exists. If you know someone who lives near rental place, you can ask them to verify the apartment for you as well.
- 2. Check Reviews**
Look for feedback from previous tenants. Many property rental websites feature reviews that can help you get a better sense of the place and the landlord's reliability.
- 3. Compare rental property prices and terms**
Understand what's included in the rental price. Who is responsible for utilities, and which ones are included? Additionally, confirm whether the space is furnished, partially furnished, or unfurnished.
- 4. Be Cautious of Too-Good-to-Be-True Deals**
If the deal seems too good to be true, it probably is. Be extra cautious when faced with offers that appear unusually cheap or generous. Never send money if you don't feel that the listing is legitimate.
- 5. Verify Photos to Avoid Scams**

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When doing an image search of the pictures featured in an ad, you can see whether these pictures have already been posted on other sites. Scammers sometimes use pictures from other ads. Pictures that look too professional could be indicative of fraud.

1. Familiarize Yourself with the GRI Payment Schedule

2. Set a budget:
Estimate your monthly or weekly expenses, including food, clothing, daily needs, and unexpected costs. This will give you a clear idea of whether you can afford the rent or if adjustments are needed.
3. Look for a place that fits your budget
Don't settle for the first place you find. Take time to compare different rental options to ensure they fit your financial situation.
4. Be frugal:
Consider cooking your own meals instead of ordering takeout. Small savings can add up and help you stick to your budget.
5. Consider Getting a Roommate:
If you have a trusted friend or someone reliable, living with a roommate could significantly reduce your housing costs during your internship or stay.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU DO GET SCAMMED

Avoiding scams is better than trying to recover what was lost. But in case you do get scammed here are some things we recommend doing:

1. Contact the local police service
Report the incident to the local police. They may be able to track down the scammer and, in some cases, recover your lost funds.
2. Report to your bank
Contact your bank immediately to report the scam. Many banks can stop fraudulent transactions and may help you recover some or all of your money. If you used a third-party service like Western Union, contact their customer service to see if the transfer can be halted:

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3. Report it to: [Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre](#)
File a report with the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre to help track and stop scammers.
4. Contact Your Host University
Reach out to your host university for any resources they may offer, including assistance with finding new housing
5. Contact Mitacs
 - While we may not be able to directly resolve the situation, please let us know about the scam. We can explore ways to mitigate the impact it may have on you.
 - If you haven't already, get in touch with your mentor. They are here to support you during your stay in Canada.
6. Report the listing website
If you found the rental through a listing website, contact them to have the listing removed and report the scammer.

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
